(End of scene.)

SCENE TWO

The maisonette. A week later. Graham is playing with a football and Sharon is attempting to play the recorder. RITA is on the phone to a reporter.

RITA I'm not a Marxist, I'm not a Leninist, I'm a machinist. (Into

phone.) I can't hear you . . . hang on.

(Puts the phone down.)

Go on, get some fresh air! You're not spending all half term in the

house.

(GRAHAM and SHARON exit with EDDIE, who is going to work.)

RITA Eddie, remember Sharon's got the dentist at –

EDDIE

Six o'clock, I'm on it, relax. (*To* Graham.) Graham, go to the park, don't accept sweets from naked men.

(Door closed.

Doorbell. RITA opens the door to LISA, dressed in an André Courrèges

miniskirt.)

RITA

Oh, it's you.

LISA

Hello, I brought the petition against corporal punishment.

RITA

Come in.

LISA

I just passed Graham in the street.

RITA

Yeah, they've been driving me mad. Hard work half term, innit.

LISA

Oh gosh yes, I've had to send Perry up in a glider.

RITA

For a week?!

LISA

Lessons. Now here's the petition.

(She hands it over to RITA.)

RITA

(*Reading*.) "If a man attacked a child with a stick in the street, he'd face legal action. Why is the same act permissible in this school?". That's brilliant. I'll sign that.

(RITA signs.)

LISA

Rita? Do you know who I am?

RITA

You're not Perry's mum?

LISA

I'm Jeremy Hopkins's wife. Ford Dagenham's general manager.

RITA

(Beat.) Oh Jesus. You'd better go. I got the girls coming round for

their strike pay in a minute.

LISA

I want to help.

RITA How can you help?

Lisa Did you know that women in America have had equal pay since

1963.

RITA Really?

Lisa History is my subject.

RITA Are you a women's libber?

Lisa Yes. And so are you.

(Enter BERYL wielding a paper. CONNIE, CASS, CLARE and SANDRA

follow.)

sodding / bloody

BERYL Rita, have you seen this? I look like a fucking dinner lady!

ALL Hi / Alright? / Hello / Hiya

SANDRA I seen that dress in Vogue.

Lisa It's an André Courrèges design.

Beryl You'd need couregge to wear it.

Lisa Rita, I'd better go. Good luck, girls. You're fighting a battle for all

women.

BERYL Are we?

Lisa Tarra!

ALL Bye / See you / Thanks

(LISA is gone. CONNIE starts distributing envelopes containing the

strike money and ticks off names in her union book.)

CONNIE Your strike pay.

Music No. 14: STORM CLOUDS

SANDRA – How much is it?

Connie Two pounds a week.

Sandra Two quid?

Connie Each.

SANDRA I thought strike pay was like a salary. I can't live on two quid a

week.
